EARLY PREPARATION

Start now!

- CV & Publications
 - Quality publications count.
 - Maintain accurate and professional webpage.
- Within UCLA
 - Your advisor's endorsement.
 - Identify 1-2 professors that you have had **research** interactions with.
- Outside UCLA
 - Maintain contact at conferences.
 - Need 1+ such meaningful letter.
- Post-doc
 - Increasingly common, and often (implicitly) required.
 - 2 yr post-doc.
 - Time to branch out and flush out the journals.

APPLICATION PACKAGE (NOV.-DEC.)

• Research Statement

- Format: 2-3 pages. Some schools are picky about this.
- Have your colleagues/professors critique it.
- Summarize your work, highlight accomplishments. Be concrete but note overly detailed.
- Is not a one-weekend job.

Teaching Statement

• Secondary.

Letters from Recommenders

- By now you know who are your recommenders.
- Inform them ahead of time that you are applying.
- Your responsibility that the letters are sent out on time.

JOB TALK (PREPARATION NOV.-JAN.)

- 45-50 mins + Q/A
- Audience will be Profs across the whole department, *not* all (if any) are in your field!

Job talk structure

- Something for everyone 50/30/20
- Start/end general.
- Provide some details for experts.
- Discuss future work at the end.

Practice, practice, practice.

• 5+ talks to various audience *before* you get on the plane.

VISIT DAY (FEB.-JUNE)

- 1-2 week notice. HAVE YOUR JOB TALK READY!
- 2-day visit
 - Format:
 - Meet with the chair and the dean
 - Job talk
 - 15+ one-on-ones
 - Breakfast, lunch and dinner are also part of interview.
- This is a fun but exhausting experience. Don't plan on writing any serious papers in parallel.
